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NAPLAN 2015 – Year 3 and Year 5 Parents/Carers

In it, for example, you will find the NAPLAN 2015 tests timetable, the four areas or 'domains' of testing, and the time allocations for each.

Please note that all students in Years 3, 5, 7, and 9 are encouraged to participate in NAPLAN tests. However, as the flyer outlines, the school principal can provide parents and carers with more information about special provisions or the process required to gain a formal exemption, if you are concerned about your child's ability to participate in one or more of the tests. **Any requests for special provisions or formal exemptions must be received by the school by Friday, May 1 2015.**

A parent NAPLAN information session will be held at Hughes Primary School, in the Library, on Wednesday 29 April, from 3.00pm – 4.00pm, for any interested parents.

Preschool News

It is unbelievable to think that the slightly nervous children who started school 10 weeks ago have developed into the fun, exciting and creative individuals they are.

In both groups many of the children are really embracing the whole school focus of 'Create'. Some delight in exploring their creative talents through drawing, painting, junk modelling, paper technology and collage with a range of resources. Creating clear representations or exploring shape, colour and textures in their abstract creations. Some are passionate creators of narratives, through developing themes in their large role play, with the small world, descriptions for their construction models, adapting and extending favourite stories and some fantastic books and stories to accompany drawings. Others are wonderful 3D creators, also using a whole range of materials, from the junk boxes, the clay, 'magic sand' and a large variety of small construction resources such as the Lego or K-nex.

We have also had the opportunity to extend some fun interests in both groups. While the Owls wonderfully travelled to the solar system on their visit to the 'portable planetarium', hosted a 'princess tea party' and enjoyed hot chocolate and marshmallows around a camp fire, the Butterflies fascination with 'superheroes' developed into some sensational cross curricula investigations, through the creation of a large book and story, role play themes, amazing models and fantastically scientific investigations into volcanos. The use of Bicarb of Soda and vinegar in the creation of the volcano, led to the discovery of other scientific experiments using the same ingredients. So far they have inflated balloons and made exploding 'snowballs'.

Along with this, the Owls and Butterflies have continued to develop their social skills, building on our focus words of being... respectful, cooperative, considerate, investigators and discoverers.

As you were aware during week 7, we were joined by Lane and Brigid from the Children's Policy and Regulation Unit, as they conducted the National Quality Standards Accreditation process. The children wonderfully made both ladies feel very welcome and it was delightful to listen as the children introduced themselves and asked interesting questions. We are waiting for the provisional report and will keep you informed. Thank you for your support.

As the term ends we sadly say goodbye to Tom who is returning to the UK, he will be missed and we hope you have a great time Tom. We are also very sad to be saying farewell to Leonie, who has been a central member of the support team within the preschool. 

Well, the holidays have come and I hope families enjoy some extra quality time together.



4S Geebung and 4L Wattle News

During our inquiry unit we looked at various aspects of Aboriginal culture including Dance, Music, Transport, Art, Clothing, Laws and Food. We also looked at Dreamtime stories and rock paintings.

We created our own paintings from rocks we found around Canberra. We ground these into ochre like powder and added water to make a paste. Using sticks and our hands we painted a human, spirit or animal figures.



In English we have been looking at improving our creative writing with various aspects of figurative language including hyperbole, simile and personification. We have also been working on our Rostrum speeches which will be presented in Week Two of Term 2.

In Maths we have been estimating and then measuring mass, capacity and temperature.

5R Bluebell and 5B Dianella News

Year 5 have had a busy second half of the term. We've had many extra-curricular opportunities such as Autism Awareness Day, an operatic production of Cinderella and Harmony Day. The students have continued with Cricket Clinics and preparation for Cross Country.

In English we have been working on revising comprehension strategies such as Identifying Facts and Opinions, Understanding Sequence, and Interpreting Inference. We have continued to learn about narrative texts and have also begun studying exposition writing. Students have been learning about the specific structure, and language and grammatical features of these text types, and attempting independent constructions after observing teacher modelling.

During Maths sessions we have been focusing on multiples and factors, 2D shapes and 3D objects. We've also been continuing to focus on mental computation strategies and multiplication facts.

We have been covering History content through our literacy sessions, and have explored Indigenous life in Australia before settlement, the reasons for migration to Australia in the 19th century, and the development of different settlements around Australia. We have also studied timelines.

Our Science unit on Climate Change has culminated in students writing a recipe on "How to Save the Planet" and an exposition persuading audiences about the existence of climate change, the effects of climate change, and the need for all of us to act. Through our science activities, experiments and discussions, students have developed their understanding of this serious issue, and are starting to develop informed and passionate opinions about climate change. We have also begun a simulation/motivational system, whereby students can work their way up the rungs of the "Year 5 Science Laboratory Staff Members" from 'Lab Rat' to 'Professor' by demonstrating scientific behaviour, attitudes and thinking. The students have been very motivated to make their way to the top! This system will be used next term as well.

Our Year 5 Science Staff Ladder...


